Dear Concerned Citizen:

In early 2010, the Burnsville Police Department conducted a Public Notification Meeting regarding the release of a Level III Sex Offender – *Dontay Lavarice Reese*. At that time Mr. Reese moved into a residence in the vicinity of Walden Road/Parkwood Drive. After being at that residence for a period of time, Mr. Reese was removed for violating a stipulation of his release.

The purpose of this letter is to notify you that Mr. Reese will again be released from detention the week of April 27, 2015, and returning to a residence in the Walden Road/Parkwood Drive area. Mr. Reese will be under intensive supervision and random, unknown visits will occur at his residence and place of employment. Mr. Reese must also comply with electronic surveillance (e.g., GPS).

A *Fact Sheet* with pertinent information regarding Mr. Reese, as well as his photo, has been printed on the reverse side of this letter. This *Fact Sheet* was created by the Minnesota Department of Corrections.

NOTIFICATION OF RELEASE IN MINNESOTA

RISK LEVEL THREE

The **Burnsville Police Department** is releasing this information pursuant to Minnesota Statutes 244.052. This statute authorizes law enforcement agencies to inform the public of a sexual or predatory offender's release from prison or a secure treatment facility when the **Burnsville Police Department** believes that the release of information will enhance public safety and protection.

The individual who appears on this notification has been convicted of Criminal Sexual Conduct or another offense that requires registration with law enforcement pursuant to Minnesota Statutes 243.166 or 243.167.

This offender is **not wanted by the police** at this time and **has served the sentence** imposed on him/her by the court. This notification is not intended to increase fear in the community. Law enforcement believes that an informed public is a safer public.

The **Burnsville Police Department** may NOT direct where the offender does or does not reside, nor can this agency direct where he/she works or goes to school. The risk level of this offender has been determined based largely on his/her potential to re-offend based on his/her previous criminal behavior.

Convicted sexual and predatory offenders have always been released to live in our communities. It was not until the passage of the Registration Act that law enforcement had an ability track the movement of these offenders after their initial release. With the passage of the Community Notification Act law enforcement may now share information about many of these offenders with the public. Abuse of this information to threaten, harass or intimidate a registered offender is unacceptable and such acts could be charged as a crime. Such abuses could potentially end the ability of law enforcement to provide these notifications. If community notification ends the only person who wins is the offender. Many of these offenders derive their power from the opportunity that secrecy provides.
